BUSINESS

AB 22-54 - Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement

David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the agenda bill. The purpose of this agreement is to provide joint sharing in the acquisition of equipment, supplies, and services. This agreement also allows Pacific County Department of Public Works to construct or assist in constructing streets, bridges, drainage facilities, sidewalks, and further miscellaneous services. This agreement also gives the city the opportunity to assist Pacific County by lending the camera truck and an operator. All these services will be utilized based on need and availability.

C. Coleman made the motion to authorize the Mayor to enter into an intergovernmental cooperative agreement with Pacific County. C. Svendsen seconded the motion; 4 Ayes; 1 Absent, motion passed.

AB 22-55 - Vacation Rental Moratorium - PUBLIC HEARING

The Mayor opened the public hearing at 7:09 p.m.

Ariel Smith, Community Development Director, presented the agenda bill. RCW 36.70A.390 requires the city to hold a public hearing regarding any moratorium placed. This allows the public to make any comments regarding the subject.

AB 22-56 - Contract with Mike George Paving for Crack Sealing Project

TIB, the grant funder, approved the bid docs and now needs a signed agreement between the city and the contractor. The city attorney has reviewed this agreement.

C. Svendsen made the motion to authorize the Mayor to enter into an agreement with Mike George Paving for the crack seal project. C. Coleman seconded the motion; 4 Ayes; 1 Absent, motion passed.

AB 22-57 - Interlocal Agreement for Equipment and Services - Seaview Sewer District

The purpose of this agreement is to allow for Seaview Sewer District to utilize the sewer visual inspection truck that the city of Long Beach owns. The use of this truck will also require an operator or staff time as well. This agreement also covers other various equipment.

C. Coleman made the motion to authorize the Mayor to enter into an interlocal agreement with Seaview Sewer District for equipment and services. C. Reddy seconded the motion; 4 Ayes; 1 Absent, motion passed.





Below is your entity's preliminary liability assessment for 2023. This notice of assessment is provided mid-year for member budget purposes.

For 2022, the Executive Committee approved an overall WCIA liability rate increase of 40% as explained in the enclosed letter from Deborah Knight and Ann Bennett. Individual member rates are actuarially calculated and can change an **additional** plus or minus 15% based on the member and their actuarial group's losses. Member assessment rates are multiplied by reported worker hours. Therefore, it is possible that although you may experience a rate decrease, your assessment can still increase if you reported increased worker hours.

WCIA offers broad coverage and includes both cyber and pollution liability coverage at no additional charge in the liability assessment. WCIA assists members in avoiding and reducing losses through tailored risk management services and various training programs.

The 2023 assessments will be on the October agenda for Full Board approval. This letter serves as your official notice in accordance with the WCIA Bylaws, Article VI, Section 2, Assessment Appeal Process. Your entity has 30 days to file an assessment appeal pursuant to the terms and conditions of the Bylaws.

2023 preliminary liability assessment for Long Beach: \$ 126,785

The WCIA 2023 property rate is expected to increase by 13% and the auto physical damage rate is expected to increase by 9%. WCIA estimates the Hartford boiler and machinery, and AIG crime/fidelity rates will increase approximately 5-10% for 2023. *Please review and keep your property and/or auto values up to date as increases/decreases in scheduled values will affect your assessment accordingly.*

Should your entity not complete all elements of the 2022 COMPACT, you will be charged a non-compliance penalty on your 2023 liability assessment. If you wish to change or institute a 2023 liability deductible, please contact Rob Roscoe before December 1, 2022. A Letter to the Membership from President Deborah Knight and Executive Director Ann Bennett

Goal 1 of the Washington Cities Insurance Authority's (WCIA) Strategic Plan is to "Protect and maintain the Authority's stability to ensure WCIA's longevity." Considering the current financial needs and to stabilize and prevent any further reduction in WCIA's undesignated reserve, the Executive Committee unanimously approved the Budget Committee's recommendation to adopt an overall rate increase of 40% for 2023.

Although the indicated 2023 overall average pool rate increase is 40%; individual member rates will vary based on your entity's claim losses and may increase or decrease an additional plus or minus 15% accordingly. While a rate increase of this size is a concern for all members, please keep in mind that the rate increases given to WCIA by outside carriers for reinsurance has ranged from 60-80% over the last several years (see Attachment A).

Factors Behind the 2023 Rate Increase

WCIA's current rate increase is necessary to maintain WCIA's financial stability and to allow the organization to continue to protect its members. As an insurance pool, our strength lies in our members' commitment to effectively manage risk to help reduce claim losses. The last several years have seen extraordinary changes in our member claim costs, jury awards, a lack of immunities protecting public agencies, and WCIA's cost to purchase reinsurance.

At the May 20, 2022 Full Board meeting, members were made aware of the growing negative loss trends experienced by WCIA. The cost for both labor and materials to repair vehicles and property have increased significantly. Members received an email in June regarding WCIA's net position decreasing \$20.6 million due to the claim payments/reserves increasing by approximately \$16.6 million from 2020 to 2021.


Juries nationwide are now awarding verdicts in the tens of millions of dollars for cases that would have been less than a million dollars just a few years ago. The immunities once granted to public agencies have been eroded by both State and Federal courts resulting in less dismissals and increased liabilities. The State legislature's expansion of the wrongful death statute has led to significant growth in costs and settlements. This past year, legislators sought to add additional exposures for police and add a component of pre-judgment interest in all tort actions. All these factors have hindered WCIA's ability to secure reinsurance above our \$4 million self-insured funded layer. Multiple insurance carriers are no longer doing business with public entities in our State and those who remain are seeking more money for less coverage.

Attachment A

WCIA self-insures the first \$4 million of each loss and uses reinsurance to reach the higher limits, currently \$20 million per occurrence. Various carriers are used within the reinsurance structure, and each has raised their individual rates over the last four years. From 2020 to 2021, a 74% increase was coupled with a reduction of limits (\$25 million to \$20 million) due to a carrier pulling out of Washington State public entity business. From 2021 to 2022 another 27% increase occurred with WCIA assuming 10% of each loss between \$6 and \$11 million and a \$1 million annual deductible above \$11 million. These changes are a result of WCIA's current claim history and reinsurance carriers discomfort with Washington State laws, jury verdicts and lack of tort caps and immunities for public entities.

FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. Applicant, Kevin Prather proposes to construct 24 multi-family units.
- 2. The subject site is located in the OTW Old Town West zoning district, where multi-family dwellings resulting in five (5) or more dwelling units are allowed as conditional uses.
- 3. The subject site is designated Commercial in the Long Beach Comprehensive Plan.
- 4. The proposed use is consistent with existing commercial and adjacent residential and commercial uses and will generate additional traffic impacts on City infrastructure. The infrastructure was designed to withstand development, and therefore this project will not put a burden on the system. The traffic will increase because of this project.
- 5. The design of the project will still need to go through the City's design review process.
- 6. There is adequate property to fulfill the City's required parking on-site.
- 7. The property is served by City water.
- 8. The property is served by City sewer.

I am pleased to inform you that Commerce has selected the City of Long Beach to receive up to \$1,000,000 in federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds for Sewer Lift Station Upgrades.

Prior to grant contract execution, this letter allows you to begin incurring costs, not to exceed ten percent of your award as of the date of this letter, for grant administration, environmental review and preliminary engineering or design work.

You must complete CDBG-specific compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) before any construction bid advertising or property acquisition activity can occur. Commerce will pay eligible costs, on a *reimbursement basis only*, after the contract execution date and the environmental review is complete (see enclosure for further explanation).

Before Commerce signs the grant contract, you must:

• Develop and adopt a policy to reduce greenhouse gas emissions (CDBG Attachment 1-E).

If your project is not ready to proceed, which delays contract execution more than 90 days from the date of this letter, Commerce may rescind the CDBG award with an invitation to reapply.

TIMING of CDBG FUNDING and NEPA RESTRICTIONS

Commerce cannot reimburse costs incurred prior to the CDBG award letter. Commerce will reimburse eligible costs after contract execution and completion of CDBG-specific procedures under NEPA and SEPA. Executing the grant contract and completing the environmental review can occur concurrently.

Unless the activity is exempt or categorically excluded and not subject to 24 CFR 58.5 under NEPA, the local government grantee, subrecipients, contractors and all other participants may not commit CDBG or non-CDBG funds if the activity would have an adverse environmental impact or limit the choice of reasonable alternatives. This restriction applies to activities as of the date the CDBG program receives the grant application. Portions of preliminary design work needed for completion of the environmental review are allowable.

Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 as amended and the environmental review procedures found in 24 CFR 58.22 apply to any activities as part of a CDBG project. The environmental review activities completed for other federal or state funding can contribute towards but not entirely meet the CDBG-specific procedure for NEPA and SEPA. Section 6 of the CDBG Management Handbook provides further detail and the necessary CDBG forms.

- 4. Payment request includes adequate back-up documentation.

To be eligible for CDBG funding, all costs must be allowable under federal cost principles and CDBG regulations, and identified in the grantee's application project budget.

While completing the environmental review

The local government grantee must complete the applicable environmental review procedures depending on the type of project:

- 1. Activities documented by the grantee, and confirmed by Commerce, as exempt or categorically excluded and without impact to 24 CFR 58.5 laws, historical structures or culturally sensitive land may proceed with commitment of CDBG and non-CDBG funds.
- 2. Activities that are Categorically Excluded and impact 24 CFR 58.5 laws, or activities requiring an environmental assessment and a Finding of Non-Significance (FONSI), require appropriate documentation with a request for release of CDBG funds submitted to Commerce.

Only after the Commerce comment period is ended and funds are released, may CDBG and non-CDBG funds be committed for activities such as:

- Advertising for construction bids
- Property acquisition, including sales and purchase agreements
- Site Preparation
- Demolition

<u>Section 6 of the CDBG Management Handbook</u> provides further detail and the necessary CDBG forms to complete the environmental review.
